Award-Winning Artist Shaped by Community

For six-time Nā Hākū Hanohano Award winner Punahale, every lyric is rooted in the people, places, and values that raised him. His music is more than entertainment. It is an expression of aloha for his community, a commitment to justice, and a reminder that where you

come from can become your greatest strength.

Raised on Orange Street across from Lahilahi in Mākaha, Punahale grew up in a community that taught him resilience, integrity, and the importance of caring for one another. Those lessons continue to shape every aspect of his life and artistry.

"My music reflects the people, struggles, morals, and aloha that I was raised with," he says. "I am nothing without my community."

Today, while he owns property in both Mākaha and Waiakahi'ula in the district of Puna on Moku o Keawe, those places continue to ground and inspire his work. That connection to home has carried him through an extraordinary career. As Hawai'i's first-ever Iron MC Champion and a six-time Nā Hākū Hanohano Award winner, Punahale has earned some of the state's highest musical honors. Yet, he views every award through a different lens.

"Receiving recognition for my work is always an honor, and I'm grateful for it," he says. "But I give all honor and glory to the 'āina, especially Mākaha and the entire 96792, the Wai'anae

Coast. These awards are bigger than me. I want the world to know that my community continues to produce incredible artists, leaders, and people."

For Punahale, success is meaningful because it shines a light on the place that shaped him. Music, however, was never simply a profession. His ancestors carried the traditions of oli, pahu, and

'uli'uli for generations, and he comes from a lineage of Hawaiian musicians and haku mele. Looking back, he believes music chose him long before he chose it. "I could have easily become another statistic from my community," he reflects. "But music gave me purpose. It saved my life."

Wai'anae Moku Nonprofit Leadership Summit Builds Momentum for Collective Action

Across the Wai'anae Moku, nonprofit organizations are often among the first to respond when families need support, communities face uncertainty, or new opportunities begin to emerge. Their work touches nearly every part of community life, from health and education to culture, economic development, social services and youth support. Yet the people leading this work are also navigating increasing demands, limited resources, shifting funding priorities and complex community needs.

The Wai'anae Moku Nonprofit Leadership Summit created space for nonprofit leaders and community partners to step away from the urgency of daily operations, strengthen relationships and consider what could be possible when organizations move forward together. The summit which took place on July 16 centered on the theme "Thriving in

the Midst of Chaos and Adversity" and was presented by the Wai'anae Moku Navigators and sponsored by Waianae Coast Comprehensive Health Center, Kamehameha Schools, Wai'anae Economic Development Council and Naki'i Ku LLC.

The gathering was designed to be more than a day of presentations. It offered participants an opportunity to build pilina (relationships), exchange information, identify shared concerns and explore solutions rooted in collaboration.

Election season is here, and primary election day is August 8. Since 2020, Hawaii has a Vote By Mail election system and you should have received your ballot in the mail by July 21. If you haven't received your ballot yet, call the Office of Elections at (808) 453-VOTE (8683), e-mail them at elections@hawaii.gov or visit the Voter Service Center at Kapolei Hale which opened on July 27.

Please remember that this is a primary election, and you can only vote for one political party. If you "crossover" and vote for different people in different parties, you vote will not count. If you make a mistake or want to change your vote, visit the Voter Service Center at Kapolei Hale for a new ballot (take your "spoiled one" to expedite matters).

If you choose not to mail in your ballot through the post office, there is a drop

off box at Wai'anae District Park and Nānākuli Public Library as well as Voter Service Centers at Kapolei Hale. You can also go to Kapolei Hale or Honolulu Hale where you can register and vote on the same day, drop off your ballot, vote with an accessible voting machine and/or get help and voting information in multiple languages. Their hours are Mondays through Saturdays – 8 am to 4:30 pm (excluding Sundays) and August 8, Election Day from 7am to 7pm.

Once you have dropped off or mailed in your ballot, you can track it by visiting hawaii.ballottrax.net/voter to make sure your ballot is received. Remember — every vote counts so get yours in today!

The "Ready, Set, Go Nā Wai'anae: Take Action Before the Next Wildfire" community workshop is set for August 25, from 5:30–7:30 p.m. at the Kamehameha Schools Community Learning Center at Mā'ili for an evening focused on practical, local solutions that help protect homes, families, and neighborhoods. This free workshop will bring together local organizations and wildfire experts to share simple, effective steps residents can take to reduce wildfire risk and strengthen community resilience. Participants will learn how to make their homes and properties more fire-resistant, organize with neighbors to create a Firewise Hui, and develop an

action plan before an emergency occurs.

Highlights of the workshop include: learn how to protect your home and community from wildfire; discover practical ways to create defensible space around your property; learn how to organize a neighborhood Firewise Hui; how to develop a preparedness plan for your family and community.

House Speaker Nadine K. Nakamura has appointed Representative Darius K. Kila to serve on the City & County of Honolulu's Ends Landfills Task Force pursuant to the Honolulu City Council Resolution 26-7. The task force was established in May 2026 to evaluate the feasibility, costs and implementation strategies for ending Honolulu's reliance on landfills while ensuring the protection of public health, the environment, fiscal responsibility and workforce stability. This is especially important to us on our Westside as we continue the important conversation surrounding the planned closure of the Waimanalo Gulch Sanitary Landfill in 2028 and to provide the opportunity to advocate for the needs and concerns to identify long-term solutions.

As we were going to press, Fausto remained a Category 2 hurricane but is still expected to be a "weakening, sheared tropical storm." It is hoped that

Aloha, Mary Lou Doehring



August 10, 1930 - March 22, 2026

Mary Lou Doehring was born on August 10, 1930, and passed away on March 22 at the age of 95. She taught piano and voice in Wai'anae from 1991 to 2005 and was a talented singer, performer, piano accompanist, choir director and trainer. She was a loving daughter, wife, mother and friend. Above all, Mary Lou was a gifted music teacher.

Raised in Los Angeles, Mary Lou developed her love of music at an early age. She studied classical piano and voice, and sang in the Roger Wagner Chorale, performing with the Los Angeles Philharmonic. After graduating from UCLA in 1952, Mary Lou married Milton Dowers. She began her teaching career directing school choirs in Southern California before moving to Hawai'i.

Mary Lou performed with Emma Veary and Donald Yap in many Honolulu Community Theatre (now Diamond Head Theatre) productions, including "Carousel", "Music Man", and "Sound of Music". After children Danielle and Marton were born, they returned to California, where she sang with the San Francisco Civic Light Opera, taught public school, and worked as a training manager for ATT. After her marriage ended, Mary Lou transferred to Chicago, IL, beginning a new chapter. She married Jim Doehring, and they travelled to Colorado, California, Hawai'i and Arizona.

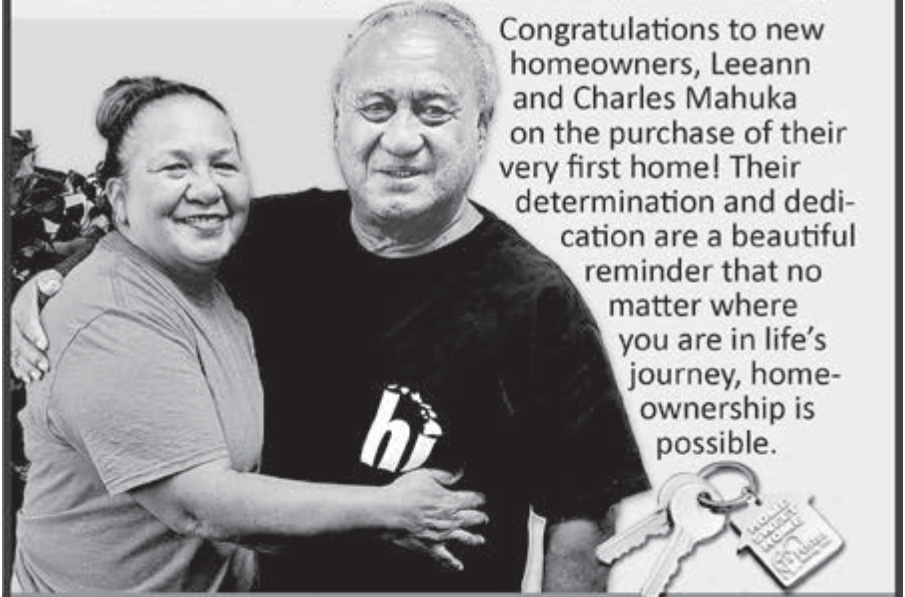
In 1987 Mary Lou returned to Hawai'i, teaching at Punahou School, St. Andrew's Priory, Kaimuki High School and at her home in Wai'anae. Voice student Jordan Segundo competed in the finals on "American Idol". Many keiki hands learned to play on her little white baby grand piano. She returned to the mainland in 2005.

Mary Lou dedicated her life to inspiring thousands of young musicians over 70 years of teaching piano and voice. Her joy for music always shone through. She was still singing beautifully, despite dementia, at age 95.

She is survived by her husband Jim Doehring, daughter Danielle Dowers, son Marton Dowers (Sharon Jones), extended family, many friends, and countless students.

Today, he works to ensure music can become that same source of hope for others.

Holding a bachelor's degree in Ethnic Studies and a master's degree in Educational Administration, Punahele has spent more than a decade teaching songwriting and poetry workshops for at-risk and incarcerated youth, using music as a tool for self-expression, healing, and empowerment.

More than a decade into his recording career, Punahele continues to create with the same passion that first saved his own life. Having released more than

ten albums, he continues to produce new music while mentoring the next generation. One of his proudest current projects is helping his students mix and master their first-class album.

Looking ahead, he plans to continue recording, performing, hosting free community events and leading songwriting workshops that empower future artists to tell their own stories.

Fausto will begin its weakening trend and will likely degrade into a tropical storm as it approaches the Hawaiian Islands. However, we could see impacts including damaging winds and heavy rainfall. The Heart Behind the Mauka to Makai Mākaha Foundation

For "Uncle" Mel Pu'u, caring for Mākaha's keiki is not a new responsibility. It is a continuation of the way he was raised.

Growing up at Mākaha Beach throughout the 1960s, 70s and 80s taught him the true meaning of 'ohana. Life at the beach was built around helping one another, sharing what you had and learning together. Everyone played a role in caring for the community, and every child was treated as part of the larger 'ohana. The lessons Uncle Mel learned did not always come from books or formal classrooms, they came

from listening to kūpuna tell stories and learning to understand the deeper meanings within them. They came from watching the ocean, recognizing its ever-present dangers, and learning how to reduce or eliminate risks before an emergency occurred.

Those lessons shaped the person he became and eventually inspired the creation of the Mauka to Makai Mākaha Foundation and today, when Uncle Mel watches the keiki who come to Mākaha, he often sees parts of himself in them. He hears young people sharing surfing and diving stories, comparing experiences and learning from one another in the same way generations before them once did. For him, those moments represent more than childhood memories. They are part of a living tradition that must be protected and passed forward.

At Mākaha, caring for keiki has always been part of the lifestyle. A cooler filled with drinks for the children after surfing, a few snacks shared on the beach, or an aunty or uncle quietly watching the shoreline may seem like small gestures. Together, they represent the deep sense of responsibility that has long defined the Wai'anae Coast

The uncles and aunties are always watching. They make sure the keiki are safe, check that 'ohana have what they need and look out for the well-being of the entire community.

Uncle Mel believes that sharing stories while watching the surf is one of the best ways to educate people about ocean safety. The ocean itself becomes the classroom. Changing currents, waves, weather conditions, and human behavior create opportunities to teach people how to recognize danger and make responsible decisions.

For thirty-five years, Uncle Mel served as a City and County of Honolulu Ocean Safety Rescue Operator and trainer. During his career, he trained lifeguards and ocean safety personnel around the world, from Mākaha to Hilo, California to Florida and Japan to France. Although he has retired from his formal position, he remains active in ocean safety and rescue training. His kuleana did not end when his career did. Retirement gave him another opportunity to bring his knowledge back home and share it directly with his community.

Uncle Mel understands that lifesaving information must be reached beyond professional lifeguards and rescue personnel. 'Ohana, surfers, divers, visitors, and community members all benefit from understanding the ocean, recognizing risks, and knowing how to respond when someone is in danger.

Through the Mauka to Makai Mākaha Foundation, he is working to make that knowledge more accessible, and the foundation reflects his desire to continue teaching the keiki and 'ohana

oration and collective action.

For many nonprofit leaders, the chance to gather with peers was valuable. Community-serving organizations often work alongside one another, but the pace of the work can leave little time for deeper conversation, shared planning or reflection. The summit created space for leaders to learn from one another, recognize common challenges and strengthen the relationships that

make long-term collaboration possible.

The event featured four leaders whose work spans philanthropy, culture, health, education, and social services. Featured speakers included Michelle Ka'uhane, Chief Operating Officer and Executive Vice President of the Hawai'i Community Foundation; Dr. Jon Kuahiwi Moniz-Tran, Native Hawaiian Cultural Educator and Assistant Professor at National University; Rich Bettini, President and CEO of Wai'anae Coast Comprehensive Health Center; and Alicia Higa, Executive Director of 'Ele-

paio Social Services.

Together, their experiences helped frame conversations about leadership, resilience, service and the responsibility of guiding organizations through periods of change. Participants gained practical insights, engaged in honest discussion, and considered how nonprofit leaders can remain grounded in purpose while responding to emerging community priorities.

Just as important as the summit itself is what will happen afterward as a summit report will be shared with participants through the Wai'anae Moku Navigators' monthly newsletter. The report will capture key discussions, priorities, and ideas raised during the gathering. Future newsletters will also provide updates, funding opportunities, resources, and announcements intended to keep nonprofit leaders informed and connected. Organizers also plan to convene quarterly summits focused on nonprofit and community development issues identified by participants.

Another important next step will be exploring the development of a nonprofit hub on the Wai'anae Coast. Wai'

anae Moku Navigators will work with 'Elepaio Social Services and other community organizations to consider how a shared hub could strengthen the local nonprofit ecosystem. It is hoped that the exploration may help identify opportunities for shared resources, organizational support, leadership development, coordination and greater access to information.

The July summit marked the beginning of a larger effort. Its success will not be measured only by what happened in the room, but by strengthened relationships, priorities identified and actions that continue after participants leave. Strong communities are rarely built by one organization acting alone. They are built through trust, shared responsibility, and the willingness to work across programs, sectors, and experiences. The Wai'anae Moku Nonprofit Leadership Summit reflected that understanding and created an opportunity to turn connection into sustained community action. who gather at Mākaha Surfing Beach. Its work is grounded in ocean safety, community education, environmental responsibility and the values instilled in Uncle Mel from a young age. At the heart of the foundation is a commitment to passing on what previous generations taught him which includes practical knowledge about ocean conditions, life-saving, risk prevention, and rescue. It also includes the values that make those

skills meaningful: generosity, humility, respect, responsibility, and aloha.

Uncle Mel often returns to a simple message, “Be aloha. Give aloha. Treat everyone the way you would want to be treated”.

The Mauka to Makai Mākaha Foundation was created to carry that commitment forward.

It ensures that the knowledge Uncle Mel gained through decades of ocean rescue work does not remain with him alone. It allows him to prepare keiki to better understand the ocean, protect

themselves, care for one another, and eventually become the aunties, uncles, lifeguards, mentors, and community leaders who will watch over future generations. His work is ultimately about preservation. It protects not only Mākaha’s ocean and shoreline, but also a community lifestyle rooted in collective care.

Through the Mauka to Makai Mākaha Foundation, Uncle Mel Pu’u is continuing the work that generations of Mākaha ‘ohana began long before him: sharing what they have, teaching what they know, watching over the keiki, and carrying aloha from one generation to the next.
