measure their learning and meeting of all the Common Core State Standards in English and Math. Their scores can then be compared with students across the nation, because WHS' Common Core State Standards are the same as National Common Core Standards. The SBA field day was open to all juniors who improved their attendance, took all three parts of the SBA, and made some growth from the interim SBA.

The whole day was packed with fun and excitement and included games, competitions, water activities, food, and prizes, a reward for months of focused

Guests enjoyed music throughout the evening, along with food offerings and opportunities to connect with community partners and program staff. The 4th of July holiday, which is a federal, state and city and county holiday, is right around the corner and will be observed on both Friday, July 3 and Saturday, July 4. All banks and credit unions will be closed as well as the post office (no regular mail delivery). All state offices along with schools and public libraries will also be closed along with all City & County offices. However, the 'ōpala folks will be working, so set those cans out.

You must have already obtained a permit if you plan to burn fireworks. Remember that they can only be set off between 1 to 9 pm. Due to all the recent rain, many areas are full of brush and tall grass that could mean brush fires. Make sure your animals are secure and your yards are clear of dry grass and combustible debris. Be prepared to put out small fires.

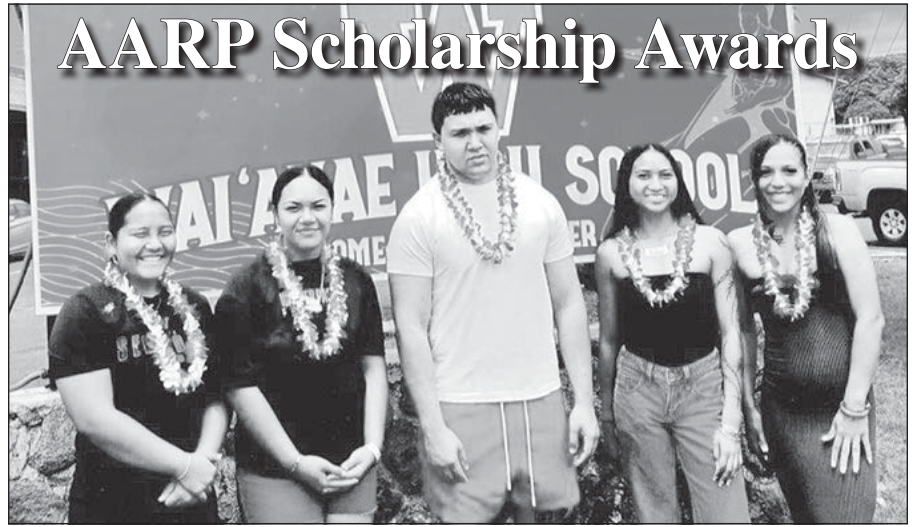
The Hawai'i State Department of Education's USDA's Seamless Summer Option (SSO) program is still serving breakfast from 7:15 to 8:45 am and

lunch from 10:30 a.m. to noon until July 17. There will be no meal service on July 3. Once again, all meals must be eaten on campus, and children do not have to be enrolled at a participating school to be served. 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2025-2026 West O'ahu Report



Hawaiian Electric's Campbell Industrial Park (CIP) Generating Station is a 130-megawatt fuel-flexible power plant that includes a 128-kilowatt photovoltaic solar system to power plant operations using the sun. Before the CIP Generating Station was developed, Hawaiian Electric and West O'ahu community leaders agreed to a Community Benefits Program for the Leeward Coast community adjacent to the plant. This update and the community programs described are a result of that commitment.

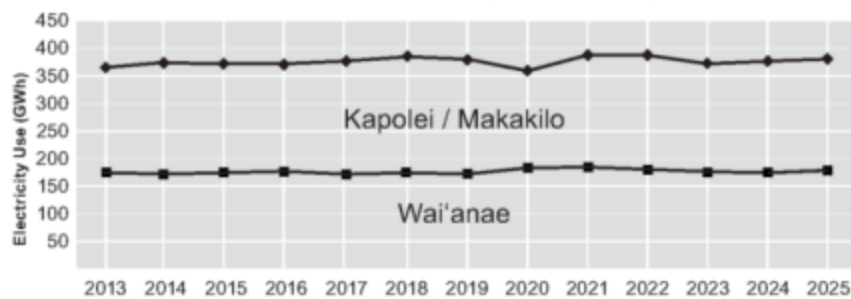
West O'ahu Electricity Use

According to the Hawai'i Annual Climate Report, in 2025, O'ahu experienced its fourth warmest year since 1990. More intense warm days led to higher residential electricity use in West O'ahu. The average energy use in homes without rooftop solar in Kapolei/Makakilo and Wai'anae rose 4.3% while residential rooftop solar participation in the area grew by 2.3% and these homes saw an 8.4% increase in energy use. Hotter weather continues to shape how our communities use energy – especially for cooling.

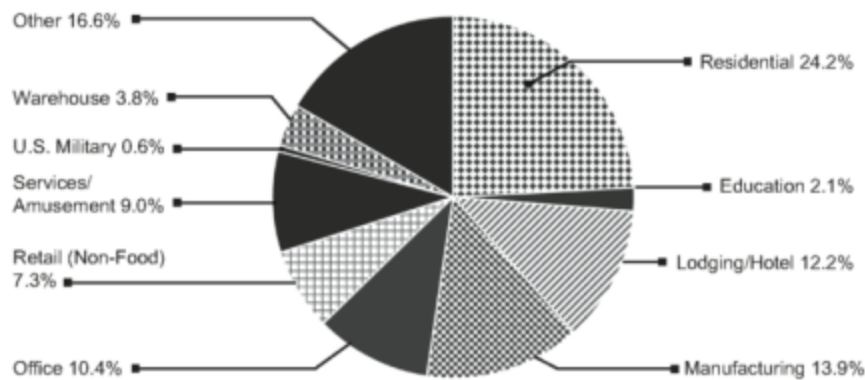
In the commercial sector, total energy use in West O'ahu remained essentially unchanged around -0.2% lower.

In Wai'anae, residential customers now account for 55.4% of usage, up 1% from the previous year. Residential customers account for 24.2% of Kapolei/Makakilo usage, up 1.2% from the previous year.

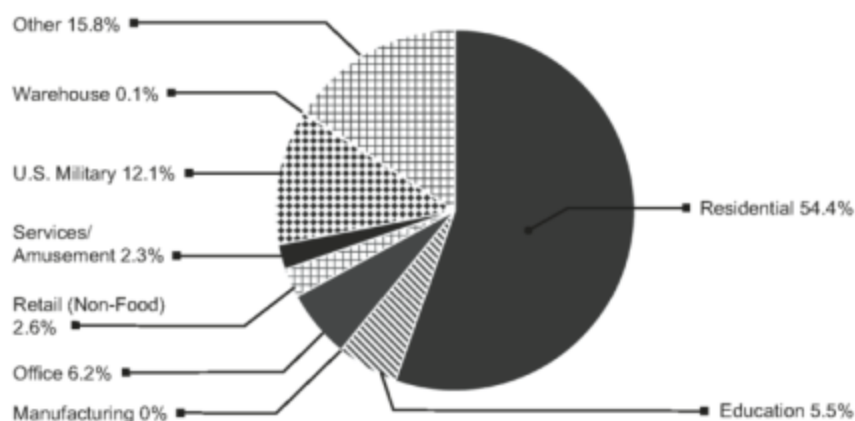
Total Electricity Use (2013-2025)

Monitoring our Impact



At Hawaiian Electric, protecting the environment and ensuring the safety and health of the public is our kuleana, and one we take seriously. To minimize the impact in communities where we operate, we continue to:

- ◆ Monitor air quality at the Lualualei and Pālehua stations. Since the inception of the air quality monitoring stations in 2009, near real-time data has recorded consistently good air quality in the region. Visit westoahuair.com for more information.
- ◆ Minimize potable water use for electricity generation at our Kahe Power Plant and CIP Generating Station by utilizing reverse osmosis water from the Honouliuli Wastewater Treatment Plant.
- ◆ Make night skies friendlier for endangered seabirds with International Dark Sky Association-approved lighting at our Kahe Power Plant and CIP Generating Station.
- ◆ Study and monitor fish communities and populations along O'ahu's Leeward Coast. Results from the survey data can be found in annual reports at hawaiianelectric.com/westoahu.



Resilience/Reliability

For Hawaiian Electric, the safety of our communities, customers and employees is our highest priority and our culture of safety permeates every aspect of our vision to build a strong, resilient and sustainable Hawai'i.

- ◆ Our expanded 3-year wildfire strategy was updated, filed and approved by the Public Utilities Commission in 2025 and calls for continuing initiatives that will harden the grid, minimize potential for ignitions due to utility equipment and remove hazards such as overgrown vegetation near power lines.
- ◆ We installed more weather stations and hazard-detection cameras and created a wildfire-focused Watch Office, including the addition of a staff meteorologist position responsible for monitoring media reports, weather products and field reports to provide more situational awareness for Hawaiian Electric.
- ◆ Our crews completed a major, 4-month project replacing direct buried cables in Nānākuli to reduce power outages for about 1,500 customers served by the Mikilua 3 circuit. Known as Surf and Sand Mikilua 3, the project involved excavating and trenching sidewalks followed by installing ducts to protect the new insulated power cables and improve service reliability for our Nānākuli customers.



- ◆ In early July, the first Public Safety Power Shutoff watch of 2025 occurred during forecasted high winds and low humidity coupled with the already dry conditions in West O'ahu. While Hawaiian Electric did not need to implement a PSPS, wild land fires in Mā'ili and Nānākuli prompted emergency response officials to ask the utility to de-energize power lines as a protective measure. Power was restored after our crews conducted inspections and when it was safe to do so.
- ◆ PSPS Watch alerts also were announced in late July/early August, October and November during Red Flag Warnings or high wind advisories by the National Weather Service, however power shutoffs were not needed in West O'ahu.

We awarded a \$1,000 scholarship to Erica Fulgencio, the 2025 **Hawai'i Lodging & Tourism Association Citizen-Scholar** from Nānākuli High, as part of our annual support of the program which recognizes one exceptional senior from each public high school across the state.

Summer Safety and Looking Ahead

As we head into the summer months, work at the Legislature does not stop.

While we continue having robust discussions on issues affecting our community and have already begun preparing for the next legislative session, I also recognize that for many families, summer is a time to slow down, spend time together, and enjoy the school break.

With students out of school and more families spending time at our beaches, parks, and neighborhoods, I want to remind everyone to be mindful of increased pedestrian activity throughout our community. Whether you're driv-

ing, biking, or walking, a little extra awareness can go a long way in keeping our roads safe. Summer often brings more children crossing streets, more recreational activity, and more visitors to our coast, making safety a shared responsibility.

Creating safer roadways is not just about enforcement or education, it is also about making sure our infrastructure keeps pace with the needs of our growing community. That is why I was excited to see Governor Green release the first tranche of funding from the \$27 million investment announced for improvements along Farrington Highway.

The goal is to build upon the progress residents are already seeing today, including the fifth turning lane and new makai-side sidewalks. Future phases will continue extending these improvements further along Farrington Highway, with the long-term vision of reach-

ing Hakimo Road. These investments are intended to improve traffic flow, enhance pedestrian safety, and make it easier for everyone to move through our community.

I will continue to keep residents informed and engaged throughout the process.

I also invite you to save the date for our Transportation Town Hall on September 2 at 6 pm at Nānākuli High & Intermediate School, which I will be hosting alongside Councilmember Tupola. It will be an opportunity to discuss transportation priorities, hear updates, and share your mana'o on the future of mobility in West O'ahu.

health record and patient portal system in Hawai'i and across the nation, Epic & MyChart will improve interoperability by allowing healthcare providers and care teams to securely exchange health information, communicate more efficiently, and work together to deliver more connected, convenient, and patient-centered healthcare experience.

Your health information will now be managed in Epic & MyChart, and you may notice some new forms and appointment processes during your visit.

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Out and About with Lei'a

Rooted in 'Ōlelo, 'Ohana, and Place

On the Wai'anae Coast, 'Ōlelo Ha-wai'i is more than language. It is mem-ory, identity, responsibility, and a path-way home. At Ke Kula Kaiapuni 'O Nānākuli, the Hawaiian Language Im-mersion Program at Nānākuli Elemen-tary School, Kumu Kekai is helping keiki and 'ohana reconnect to who they are, where they come from and what they have the power to carry forward.

For Kumu Kekai, the work is deep-ly personal. His 'ohana has called Wai'anae home for generations, but like many families from Hawai'i, hardship eventually forced them to leave the is-lands. Still, the connection to place and culture remained strong.

"Powered with the love for our home and our culture, my 'ohana eventual-ly succeeded in returning back home

to beautiful Wai'anae," Kumu Kekai shared. That return shaped his purpose. Once home, he saw many families fac-ing familiar challenges, including pov-erty, cultural separation, and other so-cio-economic barriers across the coast. Rather than push him away, those reali-ties called him deeper into community.

"Poverty, cultural separation, and oth-er socio-economic challenges is what inspired me to become a kumu," he said. "It led me to want to sink my roots deep-er into my community and share the love for my culture and language with not only my wife and children, but with the future generations as well."

At Nānākuli, that kuleana carries special meaning. The Wai'anae Coast is home to one of the highest popula-tions of Native Hawaiians on O'ahu, and Nānākuli Elementary sits on Native Ha-waiian Homestead land. In this place, Ke Kula Kaiapuni 'O Nānākuli is not just an educational program. It is a resource for restoration, continuity, and access.

The program's impact extends be-yond classroom walls. Over the years,

haumāna have participated in commu-nity outreach efforts that include giving away hundreds of free plants, helping maintain cultural sites and farms, and sharing free educational resources with the public. The program also maintains a māla filled with native and Polynesian plants and hosts monthly volunteer days where students, families, and commu-nity members learn about plants, prac-tices, language and how plants can be used for food, medicine and tools.

Through 'ōlelo, students learn more

than how to speak. They learn how to understand the meanings carried in mo'olelo, inoa, mountains, landmarks and the places they call home. As they learn about their kupuna, they begin to better understand themselves. That foundation builds confidence, pride, and kuleana. It prepares haumāna to become advocates, protectors, and war-riors willing to preserve and perpetuate their home and culture.

But no program grows alone. Kumu

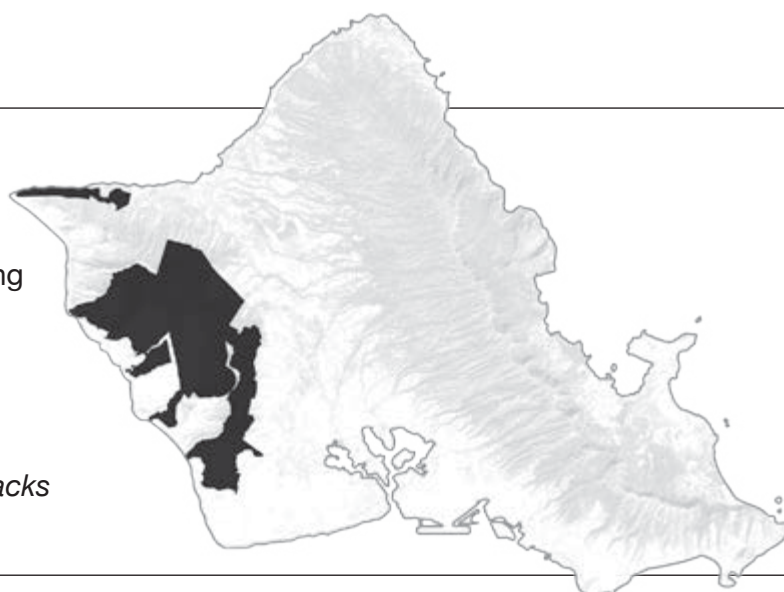

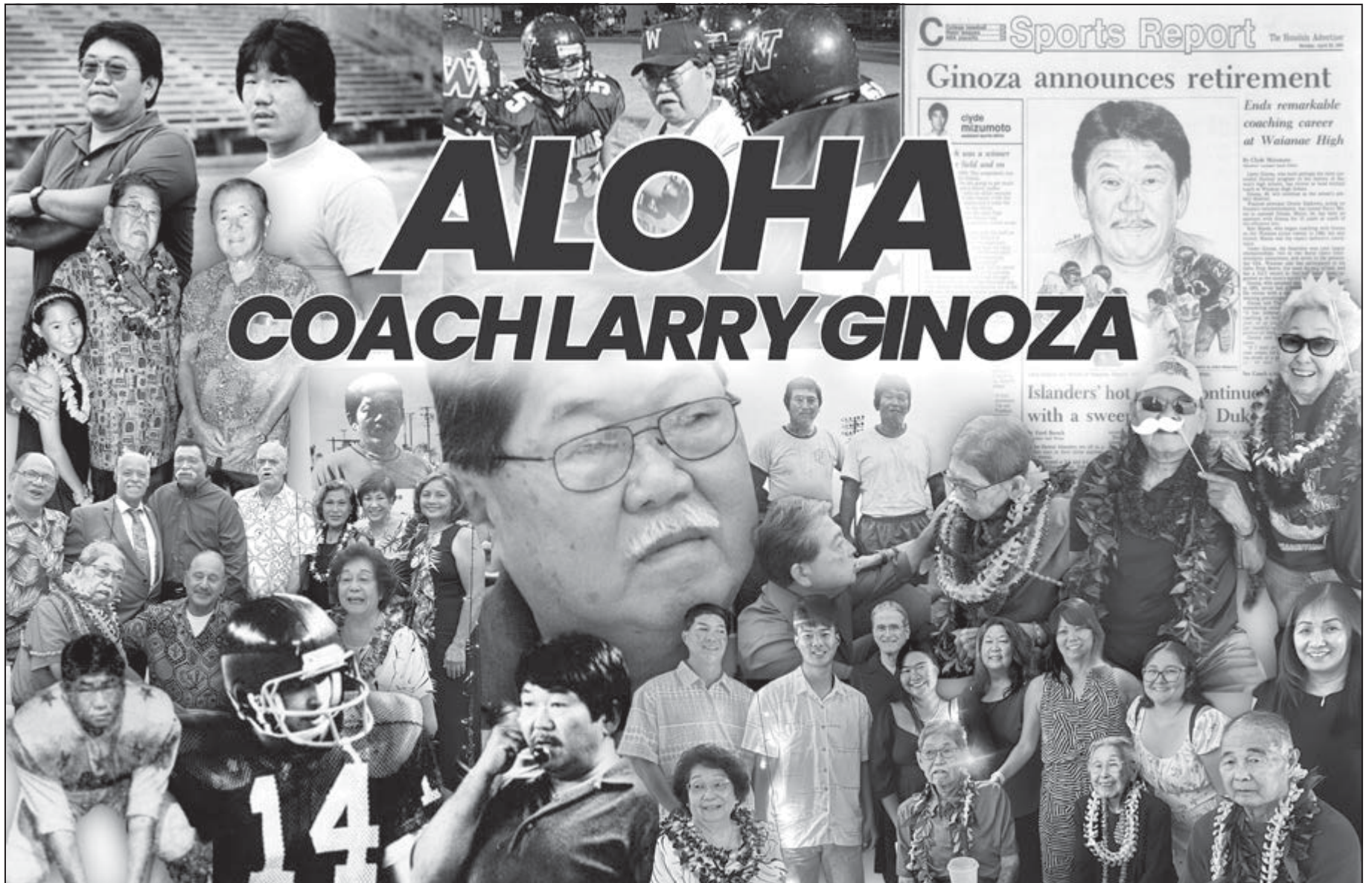

Judo, which means *gentle way*, is a dynamic Japanese martial art founded by Dr. Jigoro Kano in 1882. It focuses on using an opponent's momentum against them, primarily using throws to take an opponent down and grappling through pins, chokes, and joint locks to subdue them on the mat.

A judo uniform is called a *judogi*. The jacket is made of thick, reinforced cotton because judo involves a lot of gripping, throwing, and pulling. The Nānākuli High and Intermediate School Judo Club is now wearing new judogi with the support of PVT.



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
